Internationally acclaimed, the French quartet Les Doigts de l'Homme follows on with a flamboyant performance. They integrate rock, world music and gypsy elements with impressive speed and sensitivity.

The timeless appeal of the gypsy jazz form is vividly demonstrated by '1910', their stunningly accomplished fourth full-length album. The group stresses that while gypsy styles are the core element of their sound, they are not gypsy musicians. Coming from diverse musical back-grounds, they have been brought together by a deep mutual passion for gypsy jazz. '1910' is designed as a homage to the true father of gypsy jazz guitarist composer Django Reinhardt, with the title referring to Diango's year of birth.

Guitarist Olivier Kikteff explains: «we wanted to pay a heartfelt tribute to Django's music and to the amazing musical legacy he has given to us. He is a perpetual source of inspiration.»

The energy emerging from his remixes is definitely born from the squeaky vibration of a violin string or a boiling and moist trumpet held by an inspired musician free to make our eardrums and hearts resonate.

FLOWER OF PARADISE



Loulou Djine closes the night and offers heartrending laments and fast and furious rhythms by revisiting traditional Balkan music in a passionate expression.

The Loulou Diine group was established in Paris in the mid nineties under the leadership of the Sarajevo violin player Dragan Urlic. The Loulou Diine means the flower of Paradise in the Romany language. The group consists of six musicians with three of them singing. Violin, accordion, clarinet, quitar, bass and drums, enriched with various percussion instruments, make this group very attractive, explosive, excitable and interesting for the audience. In their specific musical expression beside the French chanson, they adopt the music of the Balkans and gypsy jazz.
